Project Delivery Workload-Capital Outlay Support—It is requested that various Budget Bill items be increased by a total of \$144,620,000 and 626.0 positions ongoing to provide resources to address the anticipated Department of Transportation (CalTrans) Capital Outlay Support Program workload. This request provides resources that are consistent with the historical 90 percent state staff and 10 percent contract staff shares and includes resources for Broadband Middle Mile workload. This request includes changes to the following items:

The national construction market has experienced significant inflation since 2021. The California Construction Cost index, which is the metric the State uses to track overall construction prices, has increased by approximately 10 percent since the Governor's Budget and 25 percent for capital projects that were proposed in the 2021 Budget Act. This request will address the cost increases resulting from these inflationary pressures to ensure projects can proceed to the construction phase with adequate funding. The request also includes funding necessary to address cost increases related to project delays for the three office projects.

It is requested that Item 2720-496 be added to revert existing appropriations for the Quincy, Baldwin Park, Santa Fe Springs and Keller Peak projects. Providing new

construction funds and reverting prior funds for these projects allows for easier project tracking (see Attachment 3).

Amendment to and Addition of Various Budget Bill Items, Reimbursements, and Statutory Changes, Support, Department of Motor Vehicles

Relief Refund Administration—It is requested that Statutory Changes be made to Item 2740-002-0001, Budget Act of 2021, to be increased by \$87,497,000 one-time for the administration of the \$11.5 billion in relief refunds. Of this amount, \$50 million is for a vendor contract to issue debit or cash cards and \$37.5 million is for call center and other support staff. The vendor is expected to be able to handle the majority of the 3.2 million anticipated inquiries, but about 360,000 are expected to need the Department of Motor Vehicles' (DMV) expertise. DMV will also build an online portal for individuals to check the status of their refunds.

Used Motor Vehicle Sales Tax Gap—It is requested that Reimbursements to Item 2740-001-0044 be increased by \$4,144,000 in 2022-23 and \$3,923,000 in 2023-24 through 2025-26, to provide for reimbursement from the California Department of Tax and Fee Administration (CDTFA) to: continue the process of collecting sales and use tax from used car dealers and continue building an information technology (IT) solution to automate the process. Chapters 8 and 14, Statutes of 2020 (AB 85 and 82) require the DMV to collect sales tax upon sale of a used vehicle at a dealership instead of requiring used car dealers to remit sales tax quarterly to CDTFA. These reimbursements to DMV will be paid on a transactional basis.

Digital Experience Platform Project Reappropriation—It is requested that Item 2740-490 be added to reappropriate \$35,582,000 in 2022-23 of previously approved Motor Vehicle Account funds for the Digital Experience Platform (DXP) Project. DMV encountered delays in its procurement schedule because it required potential vendors to go through demonstrations of their products to lay the foundation for the success of the future vehicle registration, Driver Licensing and Control Cashiering phases. The procurement schedule change moved the completion of the occupational licensing

phase start date and the resulting delay had an effect on the other phases. The proposal is for a two year encumbrance period, and DMV plans to encumber \$25.6 million in 2022-23 and \$10 million in 2023-24 for these contracts.

Mobile Driver License Reappropriation—It is requested that Item 2740-491 be added to reappropriate \$8.5 million in 2022-23 of previously approved General Fund for the Mobile Drive License (mDL) Pilot Project. The mDL Program will allow California residents to obtain a digital driver license or identification card that could be accessed through a smartphone. The project was delayed due to the following factors:

- DMV is awaiting the release of mDL industry standards being developed by the International Organization for Standardization. The standards are anticipated to be released in 2022-23.
- Smartphone application vendors do not currently have a platform ready for use.
- The federal Transportation Security Administration, law enforcement, and other stakeholders are still providing information on how mDLs will be accepted and used.

Amendment to Budget Bill Item 2740-301-0001 and Addition of Item 2740-496, Capital Outlay, Department of Motor Vehicles

California Construction Cost Index Increase-Construction—It is requested that Item 2740-301-0001 be increased by \$77,172,000 one-time as follows (see Attachment 1):

- Santa Maria: Field Office Replacement—\$20,592,000 (\$2,465,000 increase over existing appropriation).
- Inglewood: Field Office Replacement—\$20,928,000 (\$2,114,000 increase over existing appropriation).
- Oxnard: Field Office Reconfiguration—\$14,254,000 (\$2,058,000 increase over existing appropriation).
- Reedley: Field Office Replacement—\$21,398,000 (\$2,963,000 increase over existing appropriation).

The national construction market has experienced significant inflation since 2021. The California Construction Cost index, which is the metric the state uses to track overall construction prices, has increased by approximately 10 percent since the Governor's Budget and 25 percent for capital projects that were proposed in the 2021-22 budget. This request will address the cost increases resulting from these inflationary pressures to ensure projects can proceed to the construction phase with adequate funding.

It is also requested that Item 2720-496 be added to revert existing appropriations for the above mentioned projects. Providing new construction funds and reverting prior funds for these projects allows for easier project tracking (see Attachment 2).
