Amendment to Budget Bill Item 4120-001-0001 and Reimbursements, and Addition of Item 4120-490, Support, Emergency Medical Services Authority

California Poison Control System Funding Augmentation (Issue 026)—It is requested that Item 4120-001-0001 be increased by \$1,072,000 in fiscal year 2025-26, \$1,359,000 in 2026-27, and \$1,663,000 in 2027-28 and ongoing to support increased personnel salaries and benefits for employees of the California Poison Control System. It is also requested that reimbursements be increased by \$1,626,000 in 2025-26, \$2,159,000 in 2026-27, and \$2,723,000 in 2027-28 and ongoing. These adjustments align with bargaining agreements negotiated by the University of California Office of the President.

Technical Correction to Baseline Budget (Issue 033)—It is requested that Item 4120-001-0001 be increased by \$5,516,000 ongoing to correct an error included in the 2024 Budget Act that inadvertently duplicated a reduction in ongoing resources that had previously been corrected through a prior budget process. This request is consistent with an associated Item 9840 adjustment to augment the Department's budget by the same amount in 2024-25.

Enterprise Services and Data Management (ESDM) Solution - Reappropriation (Issue 028)—It is requested that Item 4120-490 be added to reappropriate up to \$3,562,000 in Item 4120-001-0001, in the 2021 Budget Act, through June 30, 2026, to support the continued planning and implementation of the ESDM solution, contingent upon the submission of updated project documents for the implementation of Electronic Physicians Order for Life Sustaining Treatment (ePOLST) functionality (see Attachment 1).

Long-Term Care Staffing and Transparency Data Reporting (Issue 47)—It is requested that Item 4140-001-0143 be increased by \$597,000 and 3 positions one-time, to implement new healthcare data reporting requirements related to the federal Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services Minimum Staffing Standards for Long-Term Care Facilities and Medicaid Institutional Payment Transparency Reporting Final Rule.

Pharmacy Benefit Manager Licensure and Data Requirements (Issue 96)—It is requested that Item 4140-001-3447 be added in the amount of \$6,209,000 and 6 positions one-time to implement proposed statutory changes to Pharmacy Benefit Manager licensure and data reporting requirements. Provisional language is also requested authorizing expenditure of funds upon the approval of the post-implementation evaluation report by the Department of Technology (see Attachment 1).

Behavioral Health Services Act Workforce Initiative (Issues 111 and 112)—It is requested that the following Items be amended to align Behavioral Health Community-Based Organized Networks of Equitable Care and Treatment resources proposed in the Governor's Budget:

- Item 4140-001-0001 be decreased by \$14.2 million in fiscal year 2025-26, and \$32,050,000 in 2026-27 through 2029-30.
- Item 4140-002-0001 be added in the amount of \$14.2 million and 57 positions in 2025-26, and \$32,050,000 and 57 positions in 2026-27 through 2029-30.
- Item 4140-101-0001 be decreased by \$52.4 million in 2025-26, \$153.2 million in 2026-27 through 2028-29, and \$153.1 million in 2029-30.
- Item 4140-102-0001 be added in the amount of \$52.4 million in 2025-26, \$153.2 million in 2026-27 through 2028-29, and \$153.1 million in 2029-30.
- 4140-101-3085 be increased and decreased by 28.5 million for a Net-zero technical adjustment between two programs.

- Reimbursements in Item 4140-001-0001 be decreased by \$14.2 million in 2025-26 and \$32,050,000 in 2026-27 and annually through 2029-30.
- Reimbursements in Item 4140-002-0001 be increased by \$14.2 million in 2025-26 and \$32,050,000 in 2026-27 and annually through 2029-30.
- Reimbursements in Item 4140-101-0001 be decreased by \$80.9 million in 2025-26, \$181.7 million in 2026-27 and annually through 2028-29, and \$181.6 million in 2029-30.
- Reimbursements in Item 4140-102-0001 be increased by \$80.9 million in 2025-26, \$181.7 million in 2026-27 and annually through 2028-29, and \$181.6 million in 2029-30.

Health Care Payments Data Program Funding Adjustment (Issue 120)—It is requested that Item 4140-001-0001 be decreased by \$3 million in 2025-26, Item 4140-001-3436 be decreased by \$700,000 in 2025-26, \$16.5 million in 2026-27 and ongoing, and reimbursements in Item 4140-001-3436 be decreased by \$3.3 million in 2025-26, to support the operations of the Health Care Payments Database in 2025-26. It is also requested that provisional language be added to Item 4140-001-3436 to authorize a one-time revenue transfer from the Managed Care Administrative Fines and Penalties Fund to the Health Care Payments Data Fund in 2025-26 (see Attachment 2).

CalRx Reduction (Issue 124)—It is requested that Item 4140-101-0001 be decreased by \$45 million in 2025-26 to adjust resources for the CalRx Initiative.

Technical Adjustment to Chaptered Legislation (Issue 126)—It is requested that Item 4140-001-0121 be decreased by \$268,000 in 2026-27, \$470,000 in 2027-28, \$161,000 in 2028-29, and increased by \$89,000 in 2029-30 to align expenditure authority with estimated costs of implementing chaptered legislation, AB 869 (Wood, 2024), SB 1382 (Glazer, 2024), and SB 1447 (Durazo, 2024).

Medicaid Managed Care, Access, and Eligibility Final Rule (Issue 303)—It is requested that Item 4260-001-0001 be increased by \$3,908,000 one-time and Item 4260-001-0890 be increased by \$3,908,000 one-time for 47 positions to support implementation of federal rules. - (b) Notwithstanding Chapter 3.5 (commencing with Section 11340) of Part 1 of Division 3 of Title 2 of the Government Code, the department may implement, interpret, or make specific this section, in whole or in part, by means of plan or county letters, information notices, plan or provider bulletins, or other similar instructions without taking any further regulatory action.
- 22. Notwithstanding Section 16531.1 of the Government Code, the General Fund cash loan made to the Medical Providers Interim Payment Fund in fiscal year 2024-25 is available over the 2024-25 and 2025-26 fiscal years for programs funded within this item. The Department of Health Care Services shall repay the loan no later than June 30, 2034. The Director of Finance may order the repayment of all or a portion of the loan sooner if the Department of Finance, in consultation with the Department of Health Care Services, determines that the funds appropriated in this item exceed the required costs for programs funded within this item.
- 23. Upon request by the Department of Health Care Services, the Department of Finance may authorize the transfer of up to \$30,000,000 in expenditure authority from this item to Item 4260-001-0001 for administrative costs associated with developing and implementing a premium collection system.

Provisions:

- 1. The amounts in this item shall be transferred notwithstanding any other law, including Section 14114 of the Welfare and Institutions Code.
- 2. The Legislature finds and declares that this item is:
- a. Made in accordance with the California Healthcare, Research and Prevention Tobacco Tax Act of 2016 (Article 2.5 (commencing with Section 30130.50) of Chapter 2 of Part 13 of Division 2 of the Revenue and Taxation Code).
- b. Based on criteria developed and periodically updated as part of the annual state budget process, in accordance with subdivision (a) of Section 30130.55 of the Revenue and Taxation Code.
- c. Consistent with the purposes and conditions of expenditures described in subdivision (a) of Section 30130.55 of the Revenue and Taxation Code.

Expenditure of these funds is contingent upon approval by the Department of Technology of the appropriate Project Approval Lifecycle documentation.

Add the following provisions to Item 4260-001-0001 as follows:

- 3. (a) Of the funds appropriated in this item, \$350,000 is available to support the development of a reimbursement policy manual or similar resources for Federally Qualified Health Centers in Medi-Cal. The authority to make expenditures pursuant to this provision, and any associated federal funds, shall be available without regard to fiscal year.
- (b) For purposes of implementing this provision, the State Department of Health Care Services may enter into exclusive or nonexclusive contracts, or amend existing contracts, on a bid or negotiated basis. Contracts entered into or amended pursuant to this provision shall be exempt from Chapter 6 (commencing with section 14825) of Part 5.5 of Division 3 of Title 2 of the Government Code, Section 19130 of the Government Code, Part 2 (commencing with Section 10100) of Division 2 of the Public Contract Code, and the State Administrative Manual, and shall be exempt from the review or approval of any division of the Department of General Services.
- 4. Of the amount appropriated in this item, up to \$1,382,000 is allocated for project activities associated with the department's Human Resources Plus Modernization (HR+ Modernization) project. Expenditure of these funds is contingent upon approval by the Department of Technology of the appropriate Project Approval Lifecycle documentation.
- 5. The Department of Finance may decrease this item by up to \$3,908,000 if the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services' Medicaid and Children's Health Insurance Program Managed Care Access, Finance, and Quality Final Rule (CMS-2439-F), the Ensuring Access to Medicaid Services Final Rule (CMS-2442-F), the Streamlining Medicaid: Medicare Savings Program Eligibility Determination and Enrollment Final Rule (CMS-2421-F), or the Medicaid Program: Streamlining the Medicaid, Children's Health Insurance Program, and Basic Health Program Application, Eligibility Determination, Enrollment, or the Renewal Processes Final Rule (CMS-2421-F2) is rescinded or repealed. Any adjustment of this item shall be reported in writing to the chairpersons of the fiscal committees in each house of the Legislature and the Chairperson of the Joint Legislative Budget Committee within 10 days of the date the adjustment is approved.

Amendment to and Addition of Various Budget Bill Items, Support and Local Assistance, Department of Public Health

Data Collection: Sexual Orientation, Gender Identity, and Intersex Status (SB 957) (Issue 241)—It is requested that Item 4265-001-0001 be increased by \$538,000 and 3 positions ongoing to support the collection of self-identified sexual orientation, gender identity, and sex characteristics and intersex demographic data and preparation of an annual report as required by Chapter 868, Statutes of 2024 (SB 957).

Industrial Hemp Compliance Enforcement (Issue 242)—It is requested that Item 4265-001-0001 be increased by \$758,000 one-time to support compliance enforcement of industrial hemp manufacturing and sales as required by Chapter 576, Statutes of 2021 (AB 45).

Anti-Fraud Death Data Files (SB 1511) (Issue 243)—It is requested that Item 4265-001-0099 be increased by \$492,000 annually in fiscal year 2025-26 and 2026-27 to meet the requirements of Chapter 492, Statutes of 2024 (SB 1511), which increases the number of entities eligible to receive death data indices and files for the purposes of preventing fraud.

Maintenance and Operations Support for the California Vaccine Management System (Issue 245)—It is requested that Item 4265-001-0001 be increased by \$31,451,000 one-time to support the maintenance and operations of multiple information technology systems that support statewide vaccine distribution, appointment scheduling, vaccine clinic management, and vaccination records management and sharing.

Coroners: Duties (AB 1859) (Issue 246)—It is requested that Item 4265-001-0001 be increased by \$288,000 and 1 position in 2025-26 and \$200,000 and 1 position ongoing to analyze and post xylazine overdose data gathered by coroners to the California Overdose Surveillance Dashboard as required by Chapter 684, Statutes of 2024 (AB 1859).

California Syndromic Surveillance Program Reappropriation (Issue 249)—It is requested that Item 4265-491 be added to reappropriate up to \$2.5 million from Item 4265-001-3397 of the 2022 Budget Act and extend encumbrance or expenditure authority through June 30, 2028, to launch the California Syndromic Surveillance Program, respond to the state's overdose epidemic by tracking early symptoms data on opioid overdoses statewide, and enable general acute care hospitals with emergency departments to meet specified data reporting requirements (see Attachment 1).

Sustaining Wastewater Surveillance for Infectious Diseases (Issue 253)—It is requested that Item 4265-001-0001 be increased by \$3,249,000 one-time to support a statewide wastewater surveillance program of routine wastewater testing for detection of infectious diseases.

Patient Safety and Antidiscrimination (AB 3161) (Issue 258)—It is requested that Item 4265-001-3098 be increased by \$1,112,000 one-time to support implementation of Chapter 757, Statutes of 2024 (AB 3161), which requires health care facilities to update their reporting system for patient safety events to evaluate the impact of discrimination, and requires facilities to submit their patient safety plans beginning January 1, 2026, and biannually thereafter. Genetic Disease Screening Program May Revision Estimate (Issue 300)—It is requested that Item 4265-111-0203 be decreased by \$735,000 ongoing to reflect updated expenditure estimates that are primarily driven by a projected decrease in program participation rate.

Behavioral Health Services Act Planning Resources (Issue 301)—It is requested that Item 4265-001-3085 be increased by \$7,355,000 one-time to support planning and implementation of the Behavioral Health Services Act.

AIDS Drug Assistance Program Estimate (Issue 304)—It is requested that expenditure authority for the AIDS Drug Assistance Program be decreased by \$50,583,000 ongoing to reflect decreased caseload projections.

Maintain Food Safety and Epidemiology Contract Services (Issue 310)—It is requested that Item 4265-001-0177 be increased by \$45,000 and Item 4265-111-0177 be decreased by \$45,000 to maintain existing contract services with the University of California, Davis to support the California Epidemiologic Investigation Service Fellowship Program. It is also requested that provisional language be added to extend encumbrance or expenditure authority through June 30, 2027, and authorize expenditure of up to \$1,760,000 upon approval by the California Department of Technology through the Project Approval Lifecycle (see Attachment 5).

Increased Reimbursements and Cost Recovery (Issue 062)—It is requested that Item 4300-001-0001 be increased by \$1,118,000 and 4 positions and reimbursements be increased by \$155,000 and 1 position to support the development of improved processes to increase reimbursements and evaluate options to recoup costs for certain services. In-Home Supportive Services Community First Choice Option Late Penalties (Issue 246)—It is requested that Item 5180-111-0001 be decreased by \$81 million in fiscal year 2025-26 and ongoing to reflect a shift of penalties to counties for In-Home Supportive Services Community First Choice Option reassessment late penalties.

In-Home Supportive Services Provider Overtime and Travel Hours (Issue 252)—It is requested that Item 5180-111-0001 be decreased by \$707,454,000 in 2025-26 and ongoing and reimbursements be decreased by \$850,673,000 in 2025-26 and ongoing to cap In-Home Supportive Services provider overtime and travel hours at 50 hours per week. It is also requested that statutory changes be added for these purposes.

Emergency Child Care Bridge (Issue 262)—It is requested that Item 5180-101-0001 be decreased by \$30,602,000 and Item 5180-151-0001 be decreased by \$12,067,000 in 2025-26 and ongoing to align to the Emergency Child Care Bridge program funding with current expenditures. Technical Cleanup of Program Funds for Foster Family Home and Small Family Home Insurance Fund (Issue 258)—It is requested that Item 5180-011-0890 be eliminated as the federal fund transfer authority is no longer necessary. New Aid Code for TANF Timed-Out Two-Parent Families (Issue 197)—It is requested that Item 5180-141-0890 be increased by \$455,000 in 2025-26 to automate a new aid code into the Medi-Cal Eligibility System and California Statewide Automated Welfare System (CalSAWS) for the two parent Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) timed-out cases to ensure compliance with federal rules and reporting requirements.

CalFresh Standard Utility Allowance Standardization (Issue 200)—It is requested that Item 5180-141-0001 be increased by \$700,000 in 2025-26 and Item 5180-141-0890 be increased by \$1 million to support updates to client-facing forms and notices as well as automation updates to CalSAWS necessary to implement the Final Rule released by United States Department of Agriculture Food and Nutrition Service in 2024, in time for federal fiscal year 2026. It is also requested that provisional language be added to Item 5180-141-0001 (see Attachment 3).

Pay Providers Prospectively (Issue 201)—It is requested that Item 5180-101-0001 be increased by \$51,992,000 in 2025-26 and \$43,803,000 ongoing to provide resources to contractors for administrative support costs to implement prospective pay to comply with federal requirements (see Attachment 7).

Refugee Cash Assistance Eligibility Change (Issue 211)—It is requested that Item 5180-141-0001 be increased by \$30,000 and 5180-141-0890 be increased by \$266,000 in 2025-26 for automation changes to effectuate the federal changes to the Refugee Cash Assistance (RCA) program.

Elimination of the CalWORKs RADEP and E2Lite (Issue 231)—It is requested that Item 5180-101-0001 be reduced by \$1,147,000 in 2025-26 and ongoing and Item 5180-101-0890 be reduced by \$17,015,000 in 20256-26 and ongoing to replace county welfare to work data reporting activities based on federal reporting requirements with data elements using administrative data extracts from CalSAWS, instead of the Research and Development Enterprise Project (RADEP) and E2Lite.

Streamlining the CalWORKs Program Experience (Issue 232)—It is requested that Item 5180-141-0890 be increased by \$1,521,000 in 2025-26 to reflect the projected savings as a result of implementation of a series of policy changes related to expanding allowable welfare to work activities, reassessing mandatory activities, and simplifying the curing of sanctions.

Child and Adolescent Needs and Strengths Fidelity and Training (Issue 237)—It is requested that Item 5180-151-0001 be increased by \$928,000 in 2025-26 and ongoing to provide additional resources for child and adolescent needs and strengths fidelity and training activities related to the foster care Tiered Rate Structure. It is also requested that Item 5180-151-0890 be increased by \$335,000 in 2025-26 and ongoing for corresponding federal funds. These adjustments are in addition to the proposal included in the Governor's Budget.

Rate Reform Support Costs Issue 251)—It is requested that Item 5180-101-0890 be increased by \$21,767,000 one-time in 2025-26 to support start-up state, county, and contractor automation activities (see Attachment 8).

Administrative Support for Alternative Payment Programs (Issue 260)—It is requested that Item 5180-101-0001 be increased by \$70 million in 2025-26 and ongoing to provide resources to Alternative Payment Program agencies for administration and support costs associated with implementing ongoing provisions of the Memorandum of Understanding with Child Care Providers United.

Case Management Information and Payrolling System Automation for Ensuring Access to Medicaid Services Final Rule (Issue 278)—It is requested that Item 5180-111-0001 be increased by \$162,000 one-time in 2025-26 and reimbursements be increased by \$1,294,000 one-time in 2025-26 to implement automation changes to the Case Management Information and Payrolling System related to the Ensuring Access to Medicaid Services Final Rule. It is also requested that provisional language be added to authorize Finance to decrease this item and related reimbursement up to these amounts if the rule is rescinded or repealed (see Attachment 9).

Provisional Language Only: CalFresh Employment and Training Fund—It is requested that Provision 3 be added to Item 5180-141-0890 to allow for the transferring of federal funds to the newly established CalFresh Employment and Training Fund (Fund 8508) (see Attachment 4).

Provisional Language Only: Ongoing Temporary Protected Status Deadline Extension—It is requested that Provision 13 be added to Item 5180-151-0001 to extend the availability of ongoing funding for the Temporary Protected Status (TPS) Program. This would extend the deadline from one to three years for encumbrance and five years to liquidate (see Attachment 10).

Provisional Language Only: Child Welfare Services - California Automated Response and Engagement System—It is requested that Provision 9(a) of Item 5180-141-0001 be amended to provide flexibility for Finance to increase augmentation amounts available from prior year (see Attachment 6).

Various Reappropriations for Support and Local Assistance through June 30, 2026—It is requested that Item 5180-491 be added to reappropriate funding from the following items through June 30, 2026 (see Attachment 2):

- Up to \$80 million from Item 5180-101-0001, Budget Act of 2024, for the State Supplemental Grant Program.
- Up to \$25 million from Item 5180-141-0001, Budget Act of 2023, for the California Statewide Automated Welfare System interface with the Child Welfare Services -California Automated Response and Engagement System.
- Up to \$1,820,000 from Item 5180-141-0001, Budget Act of 2024, for automation in the California Statewide Automated Welfare System to support implementation of the foster care Tiered Rate Structure.
- Up to \$2,531,000 from Item 5180-141-000, Budget Act of 2024, for automation in the Child Welfare Services California Automated Response and Engagement System to support implementation of the foster care Tiered Rate Structure.
- Up to \$2,531,000 from Item 5180-141-0890, Budget Act of 2024, for automation in the Child Welfare Services - California Automated Response and Engagement System to support implementation of the foster care Tiered Rate Structure.

- Up to \$40 million from Item 5180-151-0001, Budget Act of 2022, to increase the use of home-based family care and the provision of services and supports to children in foster care and their foster caregivers.
- Up to \$301,000 from Item 5180-151-0001, Budget Act of 2024, for the County Welfare Department Offices Physical Accessibility Review.
- Up to \$1.1 million from Item 5180-001-0001, Budget Act of 2022, to extend the existing direct deposit contract funds.
- Up to \$1,850,000 from Item 5180-001-0001, Budget Act of 2024, to allow the Department of Social Services to conduct a contracted zero trust assessment to comply with statewide cybersecurity standards.

Various Reappropriations through June 30, 2027—It is requested that Item 5180-492 be added to reappropriate funding from the following items through June 30, 2027 (see Attachment 11):

- Up to \$4 million from Item 5180-151-0001, Budget Act of 2021, for complex care services.
- Up to \$521,000 from Item 5180-101-0001, Budget Act of 2021, for the California Fruit and Vegetable EBT Pilot Project.
- Up to \$10,434,000 from Items 5180-151-0001 and Item 5180-101-0001, Budget Act of 2021, for administration of various housing programs.

Provisional Language Only: Rapid Response Reappropriation—It is requested that Item 5180-493 be added to reappropriate all remaining Rapid Response Funds from the Budget Acts of 2021, 2022, and 2023, to continue services for the Rapid Response Program (see Attachment 12).

Provisional Language Only: California Food Assistance Program Expansion Reappropriation—It is requested that Item 5180-494 be added to reappropriate up to \$38,000,000 General Fund to be available through June 30, 2029, for the automation of the California Food Assistance Program expansion (see Attachment 13).

Add Provisions 15, 16, & 17 to Item 5180-001-0001 as follows:

- 15. Upon approval of the Department of Finance, Schedule (1) may be augmented to continue the contract to provide direct deposit payments with vendors until the FI\$Cal EFT system is fully integrated into the State Department of Social Services' accounting and payment business practices. The State Department of Social Services is hereby authorized to provide advance payment in order to implement direct deposit to child care contractors. Contracts awarded pursuant to this section shall be exempt from the personal services contracting requirements of Article 4 (commencing with Section 19130) of Chapter 5 of Part 2 of Division 5 of Title 2 of the Government Code. For purposes of this provision, the State Department of Social Services is exempt from the requirements of Part 2 (commencing with Section 10100) of Division 2 of the Public Contract Code and from the requirements of Article 6 (commencing with Section 999) of Chapter 6 of Division 4 of the Military and Veterans Code.
- 16. Notwithstanding any other law, upon approval of the Plan for Operations and Management and the Implementation Advance Planning Document Update by the United States Department of Agriculture Food and Nutrition Service, the Department of Finance may augment this item for costs associated with the implementation and administration of the Summer Electronic Benefits Transfer for Children (Summer EBT) established pursuant to Section 1762 of Title 42 of the United State Code, also known as SUN Bucks, no sooner than 30 days after notification in writing is provided to the chairpersons of the fiscal committees in each house of the Legislature and the Chairperson of the Joint Legislative Budget Committee.
- 17. Of the amount appropriated in Schedule (2) up to \$14,784,000 is allocated for project activities associated with the Facility Management System project. The expenditure of funds is contingent upon project approval by the Department of Technology. Expenditures shall be in alignment with approved project documents.

- 3. Up to \$25,000,000 of the amount appropriated in Schedule (1) of Item 5180-141-0001, Budget Act of 2023 (Chs. 12, 38, and 189, Stats. 2023) to develop an interface with the Child Welfare Services California Automated Response and Engagement System.
- 4. Up to \$1,850,000 of the amount appropriated in Schedule (2) of Item 5180-001-0001, Budget Act of 2024 (Chs. 22, 35 and 994, Stats. 2024) for Zero Trust Architecture and Multifactor Authentication planning.
- 5. Up to \$80,000,000 of the amount appropriated in Schedule 2 of Item 5180-101-0001, Budget Act of 2024 (Chs. 22, 35 and 994, Stats. 2024) for the State Supplemental Grant Program.
- 6. Up to \$1,820,000 of the amount appropriated in Schedule (1) of Item 5180-141-0001, Budget Act of 2024 (Chs. 22, 35 and 994, Stats. 2024) for automation in the California Statewide Automated Welfare System to support implementation of the foster care Tiered Rate Structure.
- 7. Up to \$2,531,000 of the amount appropriated in Schedule (1) of Item 5180-141-0001, Budget Act of 2024 (Chs. 22, 35 and 994, Stats. 2024) for automation in the Child Welfare Services California Automated Response and Engagement System to support implementation of the foster care Tiered Rate Structure.
- 8. Up to \$301,000 of the amount appropriated in Schedule (2) of Item 5180-151-0001, Budget Act of 2024 (Chs. 22, 35 and 994, Stats. 2024) for the County Welfare Department Offices Physical Accessibility Review.

0890—Federal Fund

 Up to \$2,531,000 of the amount appropriated in Schedule (1) of Item 5180-141-0890, Budget Act of 2024 (Chs. 22, 35, and 994, Stats. 2024) for automation in the Child Welfare Services – California Automated Response and Engagement System to support implementation of the foster care Tiered Rate Structure. Amend Provision 9(a) of Item 5180-141-0001 as follows:

"9. (a) Of the funds appropriated in Schedule (1), \$134,643,000 is for the support of activities related to the Child Welfare Services-California Automated Response and Engagement System (CWS-CARES) project. Expenditure of these funds is contingent upon the CWS-CARES project receiving project continuation approval from the Department of Technology. This amount may be augmented up to \$23,647,000 by the Department of Finance upon completion of implementation services contract negotiations. Additionally, this amount may be augmented from project savings unspent appropriations and augmentation amounts authorized in prior years up to \$22,792,000 upon approval by the Department of Finance, in consultation with the Department of Technology. In providing approval of an augmentation through the use of savings unspent appropriations or augmentation amounts authorized in prior years, the Department of Finance shall consider verified satisfactory progress toward milestones associated with the CWS-CARES Product Roadmap, product adoption, and the roadmap change management process. Satisfactory progress shall be defined as: (1) the completion of planned product milestones including all planned data conversion, hardening, and testing without significant deviation from the baseline project cost, schedule, and scope in the most recent Special Project Report; (2) incorporation of relevant end user feedback into product design, development, and implementation, to the extent possible, without significant increases in the total CWS-CARES project cost, schedule, and scope; and (3) demonstrable progress made towards user adoption that is consistent with the project's strategic plan for user engagement, communication, and adoption, including clearly defined processes that measure and report on stakeholder engagements with the project (such as, for example, stakeholder impact assessments). Such an augmentation shall be aligned with planned project activities and shall not be used to increase total project costs. Any such augmentation shall be authorized no less than 30 calendar days following written notification to the Chairperson of the Joint Legislative Budget Committee, or a lesser period if requested by the Department of Finance and approved by the Chairperson of the Joint Legislative Budget Committee, or the chairperson's designee. The Department of Finance's written notification shall include, at a minimum, its consideration of verified satisfactory progress as defined above."

Add Provisions 13 and 14 to Item 5180-141-0001 as follows:

13. Notwithstanding any other law, for the purpose of administering and implementing the Summer Electronic Benefit Transfer program established pursuant to Section 1762 of Title 42 of the United States Code, any contract or grants entered into by the State Department of Social Services shall be exempt from the requirements of Article 4 (commencing with Section 19130) of Chapter 5 of Part 2 of Division 5 of Title 2 of the Government Code, and from the Public Contract Code and the State Contracting

Manual, and shall not be subject to the review or approval of the Department of General Services or the Department of Technology.

14. The Department of Finance may increase expenditure authority in this item for any unanticipated automation and county administrative costs resulting from the United States Department of Agriculture Food and Nutrition Service's determination of the state's Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program's Standard Utility Allowance methodology update.

Add Provisions 2 and 3 to Item 5180-141-0890 as follows:

- 2. Notwithstanding any other law, for the purpose of administering and implementing the Summer Electronic Benefit Transfer program established pursuant to Section 1762 of Title 42 of the United States Code, any contract or grants entered into by the State Department of Social Services shall be exempt from the requirements of Article 4 (commencing with Section 19130) of Chapter 5 of Part 2 of Division 5 of Title 2 of the Government Code, and from the Public Contract Code and the State Contracting Manual, and shall not be subject to the review or approval of the Department of General Services or the Department of Technology.
- 3. Upon notification by the Department of Social Services, the State Controller is authorized to transfer funds from this Item to the CalFresh E&T Workers Compensation Fund (Fund 8508) in accordance with Welfare and Institutions Code 18926.8.

Add the following provision to Item 5180-011-0001 as follows:

2. The Department of Finance is authorized to approve expenditures in excess of the transfer amount appropriated in this item, upon notification from the State Department of Social Services of approved claims exceeding the amount appropriated in this item, to cover the additional costs associated with the increased annual claims paid on behalf of foster family homes, small family homes, resource families, and tribally-approved homes pursuant to Sections 1527 through 1527.8 of the Health and Safety Code.

Add the following provision to Item 5180-001-0131 as follows:

2. The Department of Finance is authorized to approve expenditures in excess of the amount appropriated in this item, upon notification from the State Department of Social Services of approved claims exceeding the amount appropriated in this item, to cover the additional costs associated with the increased annual claims paid on behalf of foster family homes, small family homes, resource families, and tribally-approved homes pursuant to Sections 1527 through 1527.8 of the Health and Safety Code.

Add Provision 19 to Item 5180-101-0001 as follows:

19. Of the amount appropriated in Schedule (3), up to \$51,992,000 is available to all programs funded by the State Department of Social Services under Chapter 3 (commencing with Section 10225), Chapter 6 (commencing with Section 10235), Chapter 7 (commencing with Section 10240), Chapter 8 (commencing with Section 10250), Chapter 9 (commencing with Section 10260), Chapter 21 (commencing with Section 10370), and Chapter 2 (commencing with Section 11461.6) of Part 2, for implementation costs associated with paying Child Care and Development providers prospectively. Notwithstanding any other law, the State Department of Social Services may direct the amount and manner of reimbursement for these costs and manner of implementation in written directives.

Add Provision 7 to Item 5180-101-0890 as follows:

- 7. Of the funds appropriated in Schedule (3), \$21,767,000 shall be allocated for Federal compliance items including, but not limited to, implementation of rates informed by the alternative methodology and the single rate structure.
- (a) Notwithstanding any other law, contracts entered into or amended pursuant to this provision shall be exempt from the personal services contracting requirements of Article 4 (commencing with Section 19130) of Chapter 5 of Part 2 of Division 5 of Title 2 of the Government Code, from the Public Contract Code and the State Contracting Manual, and shall not be subject to the review and approval of the Department of General Services, including provisions pursuant to Chapter 6 (commencing with Section 14825) of Part 5.5. of Division 3 of the Title 2 of the Government Code, Part 2 (commencing with 10100) of Division 2 of the Public Contract Code, and the State Administrative Manual.
- (b) Notwithstanding Section 11546 of the Government Code, contracts entered into or amended pursuant to this provision are exempt from review or approval of any division of the Department of Technology, upon approval from the Department of Finance.
- (c) Funds shall be available for encumbrance through September 30, 2027 and for liquidation through September 30, 2028 in alignment with the federal award.

Add the following provision to Item 5180-111-0001 as follows:

4. The Department of Finance may decrease this item by up to \$162,000 General Fund and \$1,294,000 reimbursements for the Ensuring Access to Medicaid Services Final Rule (CMS-2442-F) if the rule is rescinded or repealed. Any adjustment of this item shall be reported in writing to the chairpersons of the fiscal committees in each house of the Legislature and the Chairperson of the Joint Legislative Budget Committee within 10 days of the date the adjustment is approved.

Add Provision 13 of Item 5180-151-0001 as follows:

13. Of the amount appropriated in this item, \$10,000,000 shall be available for legal services pursuant to Chapter 5.6 (commencing with Section 13300) of Part 3 of Division 9 of the Welfare and Institutions Code, for, but not limited to, unaccompanied undocumented minors and other minors in removal proceedings, and current or past beneficiaries of federal temporary protected status, to be allocated at the discretion of the State Department of Social Services. These funds shall be available for encumbrance until June 30, 2028, and expenditure until June 30, 2030. Use of these funds shall be reported in updates provided to the Legislature on the department's immigration programs.

- 3. Up to \$10, 434,000 of the funds transferred to state operations for the administration of housing programs pursuant to Provisions 15, 21, and 25 of Item 5180-151-0001 and Provision 9 of Item 5180-101-0001, 2021 Budget Act (Chs. 21, 69, and 240, Stats. 2021).
