Advanced Payment Pilot Program Outcomes

Executive Summary

Chapter 569, Statutes of 2022 (AB 156) established the Advanced Payment Pilot Program to explore possible improvements to the state's existing advance payment practices for state-funded local assistance grants. AB 156 authorizes six state agencies administering specified programs to make advance payments to local agencies, non-governmental entities, and other state agencies if specific criteria are met.

AB 156 requires the Department of Finance to file a report with the Legislature on or before January 10, 2025, that includes:

- 1. The number of payments advanced pursuant to AB 156, including by program and geographic location.
- 2. The number of payments that exceeded the 25 percent limit.
- 3. Any adverse audit findings identified in the audits.

Twenty-six advance payments were issued pursuant to AB 156, two of which exceeded the 25 percent limit. Finance's Office of State Audits and Evaluations (OSAE) performed three audits of participating state agencies and had no adverse audit findings. However, the audit identified opportunities to strengthen the state agencies' oversight of advance payments.

Background

AB 156 authorizes six state agencies—Wildlife Conservation Board (WCB), Department of Forestry and Fire Protection, Housing and Community Development, Employment Development Department (EDD), Strategic Growth Council (SGC), and Department of Toxic Substances Control (DTSC)—administering specified programs to make advance payments to local agencies, non-governmental entities, and other state agencies if specific criteria are met. It requires the administering state agency to prioritize local agency or non-governmental entity recipients and projects serving disadvantaged, low-income, and under-resourced communities, or organizations with modest reserves and potential cashflow problems. Additionally, AB 156 limits the advance payment amount to 25 percent of the total grant amount awarded to the recipient, unless the administering state agency determines that the project requires a larger advance. AB 156 authorizes Finance to audit any state agency, recipient, or subrecipient receiving an advance payment pursuant to AB 156. The provisions of AB 156 related to advance payments will remain in effect until July 1, 2025.

Advance Grant Payment Information

Table 1 below identifies all advance payments issued pursuant to AB 156 as of November 30, 2024, including (1) the agency issuing the payment, (2) the associated grant program, (3) the name of the grantee(s), (4) total awarded grant amount, (5) advance payment amount, (6) percent of the grant advanced, and (7) the location of the grant. Four state agencies issued 26 advance payments using the authority provided in the Advanced Payment Pilot Program. Two of these payments exceeded 25 percent of the grant amount; both were issued by WCB to California State Parks.

Audit Results

OSAE performed audits of EDD, DTSC, and SGC. Based on the audit procedures performed and evidence gathered, reasonable assurance was obtained that the three state agencies generally complied with the requirements of AB 156 and prioritized advance payment recipients and projects serving disadvantaged, low-income, and under-resourced communities or organizations with modest reserves and potential cashflow problems. The audit identified no adverse audit findings. However, it identified the following opportunities to strengthen the state agencies' oversight activities of the Advance Payment Pilot Program and future advance payment practices:

Required Documentation. SGC advanced grant funds without the required insurance documents and demonstration of good standing with the Internal Revenue Service, even though AB 156 required these documents. Disbursing advance payments before obtaining all required documents may result in unqualified recipients receiving advance payments in future program grants.

Earned Interest. SGC and DTSC did not have an adequate process in place
for tracking and monitoring earned interest from advance payments. EDD
failed to obtain appropriate documentation to support the interest amounts
reported. AB 156 requires any accumulated interest to be deemed grant
moneys, subject to federal laws and regulations, and the recipient to report
earned interest. Without such a process, agencies cannot accurately
account for the full amount of interest available for spending on grantrelated projects.

In response to the audits, the three state agencies agreed with the findings and submitted corrective action plans to strengthen their oversight activities of the Advanced Payment Pilot Program. These audit reports can be found on Finance's website at: https://oreports.dof.ca.gov/report.html.
