

About Census Geocoder

The Census Geocoder is an address look-up tool that will find both locations and geographies. Enter either an address or a latitude and longitude, and it will return a list of geographies that the address is within or enter an address and the geocoder will return an approximate latitude/longitude coordinate.





Use *Find Locations Using...* to get the latitude and longitude for an address. Use *Find Geographies Using...* to get census geography (county, tract, and block) for an address or geographic coordinates.




Single Address Look-up Instructions

Click on *One Line* to enter the address in one continuous line. No commas are necessary.



Click on *Address* to enter the address on separate lines.



For example, use the *Find Locations Using...* and enter in the street address: 4600 Silver Hill Rd, Washington, DC 20233. The Census Geocoder will return the following:
Matched Address: 4600 Silver Hill Rd, WASHINGTON, DC 20233
Coordinates: X: -76.9275 Y: 38.84598

For another example, use the *Find Geographies Using...* and enter in the geographic coordinates: X: -76.9275 Y: 38.84598. The Census Geocoder will show that the address is in Prince George's County, Maryland, census tract 8024.05, and census block 1083.



Address Batch Instructions

The batch geocoder allows you to geocode up to 1,000 addresses at one time.

To find the latitude and longitude for each address, use *Find Locations Using...* and click *Address Batch*. To find the census geography (county, tract, and block) for each address, use *Find*

Geographies Using... and click *Address Batch*. Select your address file from a saved location.



To address batch successfully, you must create and submit a .CSV formatted file. Format the address file in a single line with comma delimiters and include the following information:

- Unique ID,
- House Number and Street Name,
- City,
- State,
- ZIP Code

The City and State *or* ZIP Code may be left blank; however, you must include the correct number of commas to represent the blank data. Here are some examples of correctly formatted address files:


- 1, 4600 Silver Hill Rd, Washington, DC, 20233 (*No blanks*)
- 2, 4600 Silver Hill Rd, Washington, DC, (*ZIP Code is blank*)
- 3, 4600 Silver Hill Rd,,,20233 (*City and State are blank*)

Vintage Information


When geocoding your address to census geography, you need to select a benchmark and a vintage of geography.

The benchmark is the time period when we created the snapshot of the data (usually done twice yearly). For example, Public_AR_Current is the most recent snapshot of our dataset.

The vintage refers to the census or survey the data is linked to. For instance, Census 2010_Current are the address ranges from the 2010 Census at the time of the Current benchmark. The available vintages are dependent upon the benchmark you select.

Additional Information

The data in the geocoder is from the MAF/TIGER database. The address ranges used in the geocoder are the same address ranges found in the TIGER/Line Shapefiles. The address ranges are potential address ranges, not actual address ranges. Potential ranges include the full range of possible structure numbers even though the actual structures might not exist. Please note: this tool does not return individual addresses.

Additional Information, cont.

The latitude/longitude coordinates are the approximate location on the road feature, slightly offset from the road. The coordinates are calculated along the address ranges in the MAF/TIGER database.

The majority of the address ranges are for residential areas. Limited address ranges exist for commercial areas. If an address is not located or is not in the correct approximate location, it does not mean that the address was excluded or misallocated in our censuses and surveys. We use additional sources of information to ensure that people are counted in the correct location.
