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CALIFORNIA CURRENT POPULATION SURVEY REPORT MARCH 2007 DATA

The Current Population Survey (CPS) conducted by the U.S. Census Bureau for the Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) is the primary source of labor force data for the entire nation. Although information on the labor force and unemployment are central to the CPS, extensive data on the social, economic, and demographic characteristics of the population are also collected through supplemental questions in the Annual Social and Economic Survey (ASEC). Estimates in this report are from the ASEC to the 2007 Current Population Survey.

DATA LIMITATIONS

The survey's estimation procedure uses independent samples for each state. It inflates sample-weighted results to independent national estimates of the civilian non-institutional population by age, sex, race, and Hispanic origin. Because of the unique sample design and weighting procedures used in the March Supplement of the CPS, the population estimate for California is not consistent with population estimates produced by either the U.S. Census Bureau or the California Department of Finance (DOF). It is important to mention that the sample design and methods of weighting the CPS data are geared toward producing estimates for the entire nation, so data for states are not as reliable as national data.

Since the primary purpose of the CPS is to gather labor force data, the sampling procedure used to determine the size of the survey is based on the Coefficient of Variation (CV) of the level of unemployment. This procedure ensures the allocation of a sample big enough to maintain a certain level of CV on national monthly estimates of the unemployment level and unemployment rate. However, it limits the reliability of demographic information such as age, sex, race/ethnicity, and other variables closely correlated with labor force variables. All estimates developed from the CPS are subject to sampling error. The magnitude of error is inversely related to the size of the population being estimated. Estimates for the nation are better (i.e., have smaller errors) than those for the state. Estimates for a large segment of a state (e.g., total employed) are better than for a smaller segment (e.g., employment in retail trade). Differences in an estimate over time may be due to sampling error rather than actual change. Data items with broad confidence intervals indicate large sampling errors. Estimates of 100,000 persons or less have large standard errors and are denoted with *italic type*.

Estimates for a given year may differ from earlier years by more than what can be attributed to real changes in population characteristics. Beginning in 2002, CPS estimates were based on the 2000 census-based population controls. From 1994 to 2001, population controls were based on 1990 census data, making comparability to 2002 and subsequent years difficult. According to the Census Bureau, differences could be disproportionately greater for certain subpopulation groups than for the total population. The use of summary measures—such as means, medians, and percentages—is recommended.

¹The CPS and DOF estimates are not expected to be the same. The CPS estimate is for the civilian non-institutional population including military personnel living off-base or in civilian housing on-base. The DOF estimate is for the entire resident population of the state.

USER'S NOTE

Beginning in 2003, persons can report more than one race in the CPS. As a result, data on race in 2007 are directly comparable only to those collected from 2003 to 2006 but not to those in previous years. In 2003, the CPS also introduced the North American Industry Classification System (NAICS) based on the Census 2000 industry and occupation codes. The new classification system affected almost all industry and occupation variables. Race/ethnicity tables were constructed using mutually exclusive categories. The response to the Spanish, Hispanic, or Latino origin question took priority when determining race/ethnicity, resulting in Hispanic and non-Hispanic categories. The non-Hispanic categories are as follows:

- White, non-Hispanic
- Black, non-Hispanic
- Asian, non-Hispanic
- American Indian & Alaskan Native, non-Hispanic
- Hawaiian/Pacific Islander, non-Hispanic
- Two or More Races, non-Hispanic

The Hispanic category includes persons of Spanish, Hispanic, or Latino origin who may be of any race. For all tables in this report except for Table 1, race/ethnic groups do not add up to the total population because only major race categories and Hispanic origin were examined.

To assist in determining the size of the sampling error for an estimate, 90 percent confidence intervals were calculated for selected data items and included in Appendix A.

I. General Population Characteristics

California's estimated population in March 2007 was 36.2 million (Table 1). This represents an increase of almost 268,000 people over the CPS March 2006 estimate or about 734 additional persons per day. Non-Hispanics represented 63.9 percent of the population and Hispanics accounted for the remaining 36.1 percent.

The traditional working age group—persons age 18 to 64—were estimated to be 63.1 percent of the population. Children under age 18 comprised slightly over a quarter of the population (26.4 percent) and age 65 or older were 10.4 percent (Table 2). Of children under age 18, Hispanics represented the largest group (47 percent), followed by Whites (33.7 percent). Over 64 percent of Whites were in the working age group, followed by Hispanics at 60.6 percent. Almost two-thirds (63.6 percent) of persons age 65 and over were White.

The sex distribution of the total estimated population was 49.8 percent male and 50.2 percent female, giving a male-female sex ratio of 99 males for every 100 females (Table 2). Hispanics had the highest male-female ratio (106.1 males for every 100 females) while Asians had the lowest (90.8 males per 100 females). The median age for all race/ethnic groups in California was 34, ranging from 41 for Whites to 27 for Hispanics (Figure 1). Among children under 18, there were more males than females in all race/ethnic groups except Asians. Among seniors age 65 and over, however, women outnumbered men in every race/ethnic group.

Over three-quarters of the estimated population in 2007 were age 15 and over (Table 3). Of those persons, more than two-thirds (67.2 percent) reported ever having been married and 32.8 percent were single. Of the ever married, 75.6 percent said that they were currently married, 13.9 percent were divorced, 7.1 percent were widowed, and 3.4 percent were separated. Men comprised 56.7 percent of those who had never been married and 45.8 of those who had ever been married. For women, 43.3 percent reported never having been married and 54.2 percent of those ever having been married.

Over two-thirds of persons age 30 to 59 were married (69.7 percent); separated (68.5 percent); or divorced (68.2 percent). As age increased, the likelihood of never having been married decreased and the percentage widowed increased (Table 4).

About two-thirds of persons in each race/ethnic group between the ages of 30 and 59 were married. Hispanics had the highest percentage, 17 percent, of married persons under age 30 (Table 5).

Whites had the highest percentage of persons age 15 and over who were ever married at 72.1 percent. Blacks had the highest proportion of never-married persons at 43.1 percent and also the highest percentage of divorced, 15.1 percent (Table 6). Between 15 and 44 years of age, 56.1 percent of males had never married, making them more likely to be single than females, 45.1 percent (Table 7). For persons age 65 and over, females were more likely to be widowed, 40.3 percent, than were males, 10.1 percent (Table 8).

In 2007, California had an estimated 12.8 million households with an average household size of 2.8 (Table 9). About a quarter of Hispanics (25.5 percent) lived in households of six or more persons, compared with 13.8 percent of Blacks, 10.7 percent of Asians, and 6.4 percent of Whites.

For persons age 65 and over, the most common living arrangement was a two-person household (Table 10). Of women age 75 and over, 43.1 percent lived alone, compared to 19.4 percent living in households of three or more persons. Females comprised 78 percent of those age 75 and over living alone but only 59 percent of those living in households of three or more persons.

Two-person households were the most common household living arrangement (28.7 percent) and households containing six or more persons were the least common with less than 6 percent (Table 11). Two-person households were not the most common arrangement for persons, however. More persons (22.8 percent) lived in four-person households, followed by two-person households (20.8 percent).

Owner-occupied households were more likely to consist of two persons (31.3 percent); renter-occupied households were more likely to have only one person (32.5 percent). For all households, 58 percent were owner occupied and 42 percent were renter occupied. By household size, the percentage of renter occupied was higher than the percentage of owner occupied only for single-person households. Average household size was 2.9 for owner-occupied households and 2.6 for renter occupied (Table 12).

Almost 69 percent of households consisted of two or more related persons, with nonfamily households accounting for the additional 31 percent (Table 13). About three-fourths (74.1 percent) of family households were married-couple families, 18.6 percent were headed by female householders with no husband present, and 7.2 percent by male householders with no wife present. Females (14.3 percent) were more likely than males (10 percent) to live in one-person households.

In March 2007, an estimated 9.6 million children under age 18 were living in California (Table 14). Three-quarters of these children lived with both parents, 21.3 percent lived with one parent, and 3.8 percent lived with neither parent or their status was unknown. Children living with their mothers accounted for 85.9 percent of those living in single-parent households.



Figure 2. Distribution of Persons (15+) by Marital Status and Age Group



Figure 3. Distribution of Married Persons (15+) by Age Group and Race/Ethnicity








Figure 7. Distribution of Households and Persons by Household Size






Figure 8. Homeownership Rates by Household Size

II. Health and Health Insurance

In 2007, the percentage of California's estimated 36.2 million persons who reported their health as good to excellent was 89.4 percent (Table 15). Just over a third of Californians age 65 and over (34.1 percent) reported their health as fair to poor, compared to 10.4 percent of persons age 18 to 64 and just 2 percent of those under age 18. The percentage of persons reporting their health as excellent declined from 47.5 percent for those under 18 to 10.9 percent of persons age 65 and over. Less than 2 percentage points separated men who reported their health as good to excellent (90.2 percent) from women (88.6 percent).

As educational attainment increased, self-reported health status increased as well. For persons who were not high school graduates, 74.5 percent reported their health as good to excellent, compared to 82.1 percent of high school graduates; 85.6 percent of persons with some college or an Associate degree; 92.1 percent of Bachelor degree holders; and 92.5 percent of those with a Master's degree or higher (Table 15). The native born (90.3 percent) were more likely to report their health as good to excellent than were the foreign born (86.9 percent). Persons living in poverty were less likely than those not living in poverty to report their health as very good to excellent.

Of California's estimated 36.2 million population, 6.8 million—or 18.8 percent—did not have health insurance. Men were less likely to have health insurance (78.8 percent) than were women, 83.7 percent (Table 16). The positive effects of Medicare—the federal program for the elderly and disabled—were evident with those aged 65 and over having the lowest rates of uninsured persons at only 2.7 percent. Almost a third of Hispanics (31.1 percent) lacked health insurance coverage; Whites (10.1 percent) had the lowest percentage. For persons age 25 and over, higher levels of educational attainment were associated with higher levels of health insurance coverage: only 6.2 percent of those with a Master's degree or higher did not have health insurance, compared to 37.1 of those with less than a high school education. About a third of the foreign born (32.9 percent) and of persons below poverty (32 percent) had no health insurance. Among the estimated 6.8 million persons lacking health insurance, 80.4 percent were age 18 to 64; 56.3 were male; and 60 percent were Hispanic.

Private health insurance accounted for 62.6 percent of those with health insurance (Table 17). Medicaid was the next most common type of coverage at 16 percent.

As expected, there were age differences in the type of government-sponsored health insurance coverage (Tables 18 through 21). Of the estimated 5.8 million Californians covered by Medicaid, 50.9 percent were under age 18, compared to only 10.8 percent of those age 65 or over. For military coverage, 57.2 percent were between the ages of 18 and 64, 24.2 percent were under 18 and 18.6 percent, age 65 and over. Medicare accounted for 87.3 percent of persons age 65 and over.



III. Mobility

Between March 2006 and March 2007, approximately 13 percent of Californians age 1 and over moved (Table 23). Almost three-quarters (73.2 percent) moved within the same county; 16.4 percent moved to a different county in the same state; 6.9 percent from a different state; and 3.4 percent from abroad.

As a whole, movers were younger than nonmovers with the highest rates of moving having occurred among people age 21 to 34 (Table 23). The median age of movers was 26, compared to 36 for nonmovers. Males were more likely to have moved than females. Blacks were the race/ethnic group most likely to have moved, followed by Hispanics. The most mobile groups were never-married persons (17.9 percent), followed by those separated (16.5 percent) and divorced (15.2 percent).

The effects of educational attainment on the distribution of movers were inconsistent as shown in Table 23. However, unemployed persons were significantly more likely to have moved than employed persons—22.3 percent compared to 13.9 percent. Home ownership also was highly correlated with mobility: only 7.2 percent of owners moved, compared to 22.6 percent of renters.

Approximately half of persons age 1 and over moving to California were from other U.S. regions in the West (Table 24). Slightly more females (50.6 percent) than males (49.4 percent) moved to California from another state; the reverse was true for persons moving to another state from California—52 percent of males, compared to 48 percent of females (Table 25). Family households were more likely to have moved than nonfamily households.

IV. Foreign Born

An estimated 10 million Californians were foreign born, representing 27.6 percent of the population (Table 27). Less than 10 percent of the foreign born were under age 20 while over a third of the native-born population were under 20. Over half (55.4 percent) of the foreign born were Hispanic, followed by Asians (26.5 percent). Only 15.6 percent of the foreign born were White, compared to 54.2 percent of the native born (Table 28).

Two regions—North America (47.5 percent) and Asia (28.5 percent)—accounted for the nativity of about three-quarters of the foreign born (Table 29; Appendix D). Mexico was the leading country of birth with 45.9 percent of the estimated 10 million foreign born, followed distantly by the Philippines at 7 percent (Table 30). The countries accounting for most of those born in Asia were the Philippines (27.2 percent), China (14.2 percent), Vietnam (12.7 percent), India (11.4 percent), and Korea (9.4 percent).

In march 2007, about half of California's foreign-born population had arrived in the U.S. 1990 or later (Table 31). Almost a quarter had been here since before 1980. The longer a person has lived in the U.S., the more likely it is for that person to have become a citizen—73.8 percent of the foreign born who arrived before 1975 were naturalized, compared to the 11.3 percent who entered the U.S. after 1995. At 78.4 percent, the Vietnamese had the highest rate of naturalization, compared to only 25.1 percent of Mexicans.

Figure 10. Distribution of Persons by Age, Sex, and Nativity







V. Educational Attainment

In 2007, almost 81 percent of the estimated 23 million Californians age 25 and over had a high school diploma or higher, including nearly 31 percent with a Bachelor's degree or higher and just slightly over 10 percent with a Master's degree or higher (Table 32). Significant differences in educational attainment existed by race/ethnicity. Of the 4.4 million persons who had not earned a high school diploma, 70.7 percent were Hispanic—by far the largest group—followed distantly by Whites with 17 percent. For persons with a Bachelor's degree or higher, over half (61.4 percent) were White, followed by Asians (21.2 percent). Of Whites, 93.2 percent had a high school diploma or higher—the highest percentage—followed by Blacks (90 percent). Over half of Asians (51.7 percent) and 39 percent of Whites had a Bachelor's degree or higher.

In addition to race/ethnic differences in educational attainment, significant disparities existed by nativity: foreign-born persons, particularly noncitizens, had lower levels of educational attainment. About half of the foreign born who were not citizens (50.1 percent) and slightly over a quarter of naturalized citizens (25.5 percent) had less than a high school education, compared to less than 8 percent of U.S. native born (Table 33). Slightly more females (81.1 percent) than males (80.3 percent) had attained at least a high school diploma (Table 34) with the reverse being true with slightly more males than females (31.7 and 30.1 percent respectively) having a Bachelor's degree or higher (Table 35).

A strong correlation between educational attainment and higher personal income is evident in Figure 15. Although about a third of persons with less than a high school diploma had annual income less than \$10,000, less than 5 percent of persons with a Master's degree or higher had an income that low. Conversely, over a quarter of persons with an annual income of \$60,000 or more had Master's degrees or higher—as did over a third of those with a Bachelor's degree—but only about 2 percent of persons with less than a high school education had an income that high. Regardless of sex or race/ethnicity, higher levels of educational attainment were correlated with higher median incomes (Tables 38 and 39). Given the same level of educational attainment, men still had higher incomes than women (Figure 17).

Figure 13. Distribution of Persons (25+) by Educational Attainment and Race/Ethnicity



Figure 14. Distribution of Persons (25+) by Educational Attainment and Nativity



Figure 15. Distribution of Persons (25+) by Educational Attainment and Personal Income (2006)



Figure 16. Median Personal Income (2006) for Persons (25+) by Educational Attainment and Race Ethnicity




VI. Labor Force Characteristics

Of the estimated 27.7 million persons age 16 and over in 2007, the CPS estimated that 18.2 million (65.7 percent) were in the civilian labor force (Table 40). Of the 34.3 percent not in the civilian labor force, 63.3 percent were female. However, females comprised 44.3 percent of persons in the civilian labor force and males 55.7 percent. At all ages, more males than females were in the civilian labor force.

As with gender, civilian labor force participation rates differed by race/ethnicity. Hispanics had the highest participation rate (68.9 percent), followed by Asians and Whites (both at 65 percent) and Blacks (56.6 percent) (Table 41). Blacks had the highest percentage of unemployed persons (10.4 percent), followed by Hispanics (6.2 percent). The percentage unemployed for Asians (4.5 percent) and Whites (4.3 percent) were similar.

By major industrial groups, about a fifth of employed persons worked in the educational and health services group (20.2 percent), followed by the wholesale and retail trade (14.1 percent) as shown in Table 42. Mining (0.1 percent) had the fewest persons employed but had the second-highest median income (\$51,000); only the public administration group had a higher median income (\$53,000). Persons employed in financial activities had the highest average income, \$74,054, followed by the information industrial group, \$66, 058 (Table 42). By major occupational classification, management, business, and financial occupations had the highest median (\$60,000) and average income (\$81,991).

Overall, median family income in 2006 was \$62,005. Families with no employed persons had the lowest median family income (\$25,134) and families with three or more employed persons had the highest (\$95,303).

Figure 18. Persons (16+) by Age, Civilian Labor Force Participation Rate, and Sex



VII. Income

<u>Personal Income</u>: Median personal income in 2006 for females, \$15,000, was significantly lower than that of males, \$27,619 (Table 45). Of the 7 percent of persons with personal income of \$100,000 or more, only 30.6 percent were female, compared to 69.4 percent male. Conversely, females comprised 63.8 percent of workers at the lowest level of personal income (less than \$10,000 per year).

Of the estimated 3.8 million Californians age 65 and over, slightly more than three-quarters of both males and females received Social Security (Table 46). However, 7.7 percent of females received Supplemental Security Income, compared to 4.6 percent of males. Mean and median personal income were significantly higher for males age 65 and over than for females (Table 47).

<u>Family Income</u>: Of the estimated 8.8 million families in 2007, 41.9 percent had incomes of \$75,000 or more and 30.7 percent had incomes less than \$40,000 (Table 48). By race/ethnicity of the householder, significantly more White (52.9 percent) and Asian (51.1 percent) families had incomes of \$75,000 or more than did Black (33.4 percent) and Hispanic (23.5 percent) families. Conversely, Hispanics (44.3 percent) and Blacks (38.9 percent) had the highest percentage of families with incomes of less than \$40,000; White (22.5 percent) and Asian families (24.2 percent) had the lowest percentages. Families with White (\$79,313) and Asian (\$77,000) head of household had median incomes above the state median of \$62,005; Black (\$53,370) and Hispanic (\$44,400) headed families were below. Families with four persons had the highest median income and those with two members had the lowest (Table 49).

Household Income: A quarter of the estimated 12.8 million households (25.2 percent) had income of \$100,000 or more; 29.3 percent earned between \$50,000 and \$100,000; and 45.5 percent were below \$50,000 (Table 48). Households headed by persons less than 35 years of age and by persons age 65 or over had median income below the state median of \$55,000 (Table 50). Households consisting of four persons had the highest median income (\$75,000) and one-person households had the lowest (\$29,576) as shown in Table 51.

Figure 19. Distribution of Persons (15+) by Personal Income (2006) and Sex



Figure 20. Distribution of Families by Family Income (2006) and Race/Ethnicity of Householder



Figure 21. Median Household Income (2006) by Age of Householder



VIII. Poverty

The overall poverty rate in 2007 was estimated to be 12.4 percent (Table 53) but it varied significantly by race/ethnicity. Blacks had the highest percentage living below poverty (21 percent), which was almost three times higher than Whites at 7.1 percent. Almost 80 percent of Whites (the state's largest race/ethnic group) lived at 200 percent or higher of the poverty level, compared to slightly over half of Hispanics (the second-largest group). The poverty rate for females, 13.2 percent, was greater than that for males, 11.5 percent (Table 54). By age group, children under the age of 18 were more likely than any other age group to live in poverty.

Like gender and age, poverty rates varied significantly by family type. Married-couple families comprised almost three-quarters of California's estimated 8.8 million families in 2007, but only 6.1 percent of the families living in poverty (Table 55). Female-headed families who made up 18.6 percent of families—the next largest family type—were the most likely to have lived in poverty at 23.1 percent. Male-headed households, only 7.2 percent of all family households, made up about 9 percent of families living in poverty. Only 3.8 percent of families without children lived below poverty but 14.4 percent of families with children lived in poverty.



Figure 23. Distribution of Persons Below the Poverty Level by Age



Appendix B: Major Changes in the Current Population Survey Since 1985

2005: Every ten years, the CPS sample is redesigned to reflect the results of the most recent decennial census. As of March 2005, the sample was in the middle of being redesigned, with about 55 percent of the sample based on the 2000 census and the balance on the 1990 census. In 2005, the substate identifiers were also updated to reflect the most current metropolitan-area definitions using the June 30, 2003, metropolitan-core-based statistical area definitions.

2004: Population controls were updated to reflect revised estimates of net international migration for 2000 through 2003. This resulted in a decrease in the estimated size of the non-institutionalized civilian population, labor force, and employment levels.

2003: In addition to the name change from Annual Demographic to Annual Social and Economic Supplement, modifications to existing CPS variables were made and new variables were introduced. In 2003, persons were able to report more than one race. As a result, the old race variables were replaced with new ones. Again beginning this year, CPS began using the North American Industry Classification System (NAICS) based on the Census 2000 industry and occupation codes. The new classification system affected all industry and occupation variables.

2002: The 2002 CPS Annual Demographic File (ADF) contained the expanded sample of state estimates of children's health insurance coverage that was implemented in 2001. The expanded sample accounts for the addition of about 34,500 households nationwide and 1,231 households for California in 2002. The 2002 ADF also used weights based on Census 2000 population controls, instead of the 1990 population controls used in previous years. Using 2000-based weights affects weighted frequencies, which are noticeable when comparing 2002 to earlier years.

2001: The Census Bureau expanded the sample size to improve state estimates of children's health insurance coverage in the winter of 2001-02. These data were released in autumn of 2002. The original September 2001 sample file was revised because of a weight adjustment. This report contains only data from the original revised sample file released December 2001.

1996: The sample size taken in Los Angeles County was significantly reduced. The March survey for the first time contained a question on self-reported health status of the respondents.

1994: The independent national population controls used for age, sex, race, and Hispanic origin were prepared by projecting forward the population as enumerated in the 1990 decennial census adjusted for the 1990 census undercount. Most estimates in the profile were affected by these changes.

1990: The sample reduction from 1989 was restored.

1989: The sample size for California was reduced by approximately 38 percent.

1985: Controls for the Hispanic population were introduced for the first time. These controls included an estimate of illegal immigrants.
