## Disaster Response-Emergency Operation Account—COVID-19 Direct Response Operations

Pursuant to the provisions of Government Code section 8690.6 the following report is respectfully submitted.

Government Code section 8690.6 makes Disaster Response-Emergency Operations Account (DREOA) funds available, upon allocation by the Director of Finance, to state agencies for disaster response operation costs incurred as a result of a proclaimed state of emergency.

On March 4, 2020, Governor Newsom proclaimed a state of emergency for an outbreak of a respiratory illness due to a novel coronavirus, a disease known as COVID-19. On March 22, 2020, a Presidential Major Disaster Declaration was issued.

Since March 18, 2020, Finance has sent written notification and provided numerous briefings to the Legislature on approximately \$2.2 billion in allocations from DREOA and Control Section 36.00 associated with COVID-19 response. In order to continue these efforts through June 30, 2020, it is estimated that an additional \$1.831 billion is necessary (as detailed in the cost estimate attached); therefore, Finance will transfer this amount to DREOA.

This \$1.831 billion DREOA transfer is necessary to continue emergency response actions through the end of the current fiscal year, as follows:

Procurements—\$1.3 billion to procure personal protective equipment. The state
has been able to secure a dependable supply of medical-grade masks and has
also procured other critical supplies, such as medical equipment, gloves, and
gowns.

- Hospital and Medical Surge—\$251.7 million to establish and support over 3,000 beds.
- Hotels for Healthcare Workers and Support Staff—\$30 million for hotels for staff
  who care for or come into contact with COVID-19 patients in the medical system
  and who cannot self-isolate at home have been provided free or low-cost hotel
  accommodations.
- State Response Operations and Other Support Services—\$159.4 million to cover costs for ongoing state response activities, as well as the call center for the general public.
- Testing, Contact Tracing and Tracking—\$98.4 million to support statewide testing and contact tracing and tracking.

Consistent with previous COVID-19-related expenditures, it is estimated that approximately 75 percent of these costs will be reimbursed from federal FEMA funding.

The May Revision reflects \$1.5 billion in 2020-21 for continuing commitments to respond to the COVID-19 emergency:

- Procurements—\$500 million for continued deliveries of procurements for personal protective equipment.
- Hospital and Medical Surge—\$347.2 million to support up to 5,000 beds, if necessary.
- Support for Vulnerable Populations—\$50 million for additional food purchases for food banks.
- Other Support Services—\$17.3 million to maintain the COVID-19 call center for the general public.
- Testing, Contact Tracing and Tracking—\$575 million to support statewide testing and contact tracing and tracking.

In our April 10, 2020, COVID-19 Interim Fiscal Update letter, Finance's preliminary estimate of the state's emergency response-related expenditures though 2020 was approximately \$7 billion. Based on the most recent estimates of expenditures already made, as well as existing commitments, the Administration's May Revision reflects \$5.7 billion in expenditures for these known costs. The Administration also intends to submit an additional DREOA notification letter on July 1st for budget year costs associated with continuing commitments.

However, there remains significant concern about a potential second wave of COVID-19 infections this fall, after the Legislature's planned adjournment. To prepare for such a potential outbreak, the May Revision proposes a \$2.9 billion contingency reserve for COVID-19 related response expenditures (planned expenditures are detailed in the attached cost estimate). Consistent with the language approved in SB 89, this contingency reserve proposal contains similar legislative notification requirements before expenditures are made. If additional expenditures are needed during the legislative session beyond the amounts identified in the contingency, the Administration will work with the Legislature on specific supplemental appropriations.

The following chart reflects the DREOA transfer noticed by this letter, as well as a summary of the estimated COVID-19 expenditures reflected in May Revision. Of particular note, since the release of the May Revision, the federal government is continuing to update its guidelines on the eligible purposes of federal funding. The Administration is committed to maximizing the use of these federal funds.

In addition, the federal government recently announced that states may use Coronavirus Relief Fund for the state cost share of FEMA reimbursements.
