Section 11.90—Shift Allocations to Support the State's COVID-19 Response from the General Fund to the Coronavirus Relief Fund

Pursuant to the provisions of Control Section (CS) 11.90, 2021 Budget Act, the following report is respectfully submitted.

Subdivision (c) of CS 11.90 authorizes the Director of Finance to allocate federal funds from the Coronavirus Relief Fund (CRF) in the Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security (CARES) Act (P.L. 116-136) to offset or reduce General Fund appropriations made in the 2019–20, 2020–21, and 2021-22 fiscal years to support the COVID-19 response between March 1, 2020, and December 31, 2021.

Attachment A summarizes CRF expenditures through September 30, 2021, totaling nearly \$2.4 billion, and meets the criteria outlined by the U.S. Treasury for use of these funds. Based on expenditures reported to date, more than 96 percent of the funding allocated to state offsets have been realized. In addition, all the funds approved by the Legislature and allocated to cities, counties, and community colleges have been fully spent. The Department of Housing and Community Development spent a total of \$747 million for 94 Homekey projects with 51 local entities. An additional \$3 million has been spent for program administration and will be reported to the U.S. Treasury in the next reporting cycle.

Nearly \$10.2 million of the \$4.4 billion allocated to schools was not spent by the May 31, 2021 deadline, which was extended pursuant to Chapter 10, Statutes of 2021. Attachment B identifies the local education agencies that did not apply for the funds, did not fully spend their allocation, or were ineligible to receive a disbursement. Finance recommends using these funds to increase the state offsets as authorized in CS 11.90.

As we near the federal deadline, we will continue to monitor expenditures and prioritize use of the CRF, in lieu of General Fund, to prevent CRF from being unspent and returned to the U.S. Treasury. After accounting for items summarized above and interest earnings totaling \$42.6 million, approximately \$149.3 million is available to offset state COVID-19 response costs, including staff redirected to contact tracing. Based on information we have gathered, we anticipate all remaining funding will be allocated in our next report to the Joint Legislative Budget Committee.
